

■ How to apply

Students interested in applying to the Psychology in Europe program should contact Denis Nissim-Sabat. A minimum 2.0 GPA is required. Once accepted by Professor Nissim-Sabat, students register to study abroad on the UMW Eaglelink portal (go to the “Academics” tab, click on the “Study Abroad” channel, and follow the prompts). Non-UMW students may apply, but must include a letter of recommendation from a full-time professor at their institution. Those candidates will be selected on the basis of their academic records or recommendations.

■ Program Fees

The total cost of the UMW Psychology in Europe summer program is \$3,900. The total cost includes round-trip airfare from Dulles International Airport to Heathrow Airport and return from Vienna International Airport to Dulles; airport transfer to hotel; hotel accommodations including all taxes, gratuities, and breakfast; youth Eurailpass; public transportation tickets within each city; and admission to all the educational activities. The fee does not include the cost of tuition, lunch, dinner, and other incidentals. A non-refundable deposit of \$500 is due Jan. 29, 2010, along with registration. Subsequent payments are due Feb. 12 (\$1,700), and March 15, 2010 (\$1,700). A 10 percent late fee will be imposed on outstanding balances after March 15, 2010. **Please note that the program costs are subject to change without notice, depending on the exchange rate at the time of payment.**

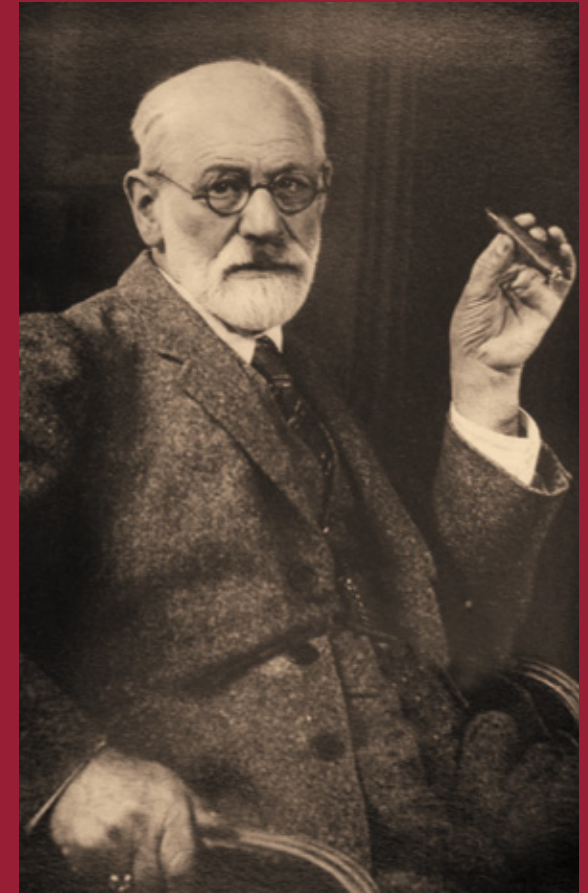

■ Psychology in Europe

The Department of Psychology of the University of Mary Washington will offer the fourth Psychology in Europe course May 10–24, 2010. This two-week program



will include visits to the cities of London, Amsterdam, Wurzburg, Prague, and Vienna to trace the development of psychology in Europe prior to its origin in the United States.

Students will visit nine psychology-related sites, which will include the Freud Museum in London, Charles Darwin's House, Virginia Woolf's House, Van Gogh Museum, Anne Frank House, Centre for the History of Psychology, Theresienstadt Concentration Camp, Viktor Frankl Institute, and Freud's House in Vienna. In addition, two walking tours of Vienna are planned: one of the Jewish Community and the other of Vienna Woods. Students will grow to appreciate the different cultures and the influence they have had upon the development of psychology.

■ Program

Here is a unique opportunity to see the original house where Sigmund Freud treated his patients and to view the famous couch his patients used to report their dreams and reveal their hidden secrets. Visit the house where Charles

Darwin wrote *On the Origin of Species*, and where Virginia Woolf lived outside of London. Hear formal presentations at the Centre for the History of Psychology and the Viktor Frankl Institute. Experience the concentration camp and gas chambers at Theresienstadt, outside of Prague, which stands as a reminder of the genocide and extermination of six million Jews.

■ Excursions

The trip has been designed to provide each student with an opportunity to experience each city and country. Although

psychology-related visits are scheduled for each day, each student will have the opportunity, during the remainder of the day, to sightsee and experience the culture in each country. Students will be provided with a list of additional sites and will be free to choose the ones they wish to visit.



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■ Course Work and Trip Requirements

The seminar will be limited to 12 students. Each student must have been enrolled in General Psychology. The course is an interdisciplinary course, and each student will receive three credits that will count toward the Global Inquiry requirement. Prior to leaving for Europe, each student will be provided with a syllabus outlining the major requirements for the course. In addition, each student will be asked to keep a daily log of his or her experiences and submit the log at the end of the trip.

■ Housing

Hotel accommodations for each student will be made in three-star hotels. Each student will share a room, which will be equipped with twin beds and a private bath.
